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Tip #1: Know what biosecurity is (and is not)





Definition: Biosecurity is the set of steps we take to prevent animals from being infected with or spreading pathogens.





Tip #2: Know where the risks come from!





CHIP: C for Cleanliness H for History I for Isolation P for Proper Management Practices





Cleanliness

- Waste management
- Tools and equipment
- Sick animal areas
- Traffic patterns
- Others?





History

- Where did your animals come from?
- What diseases impact your species?
- Vaccination protocols
- Records, records, records
- Others?





Isolation

- Separate new animals for 14-30 days
- Monitor for signs of illness
- Treat disease or sickness
- Create zones of isolation for tools, equipment, clothing
- Others?





Proper management practices

- Keep healthy animals healthy
- Vaccination protocols
- Managing what's coming on and leaving your farm (people and animals)
- Monitoring for signs of illness
