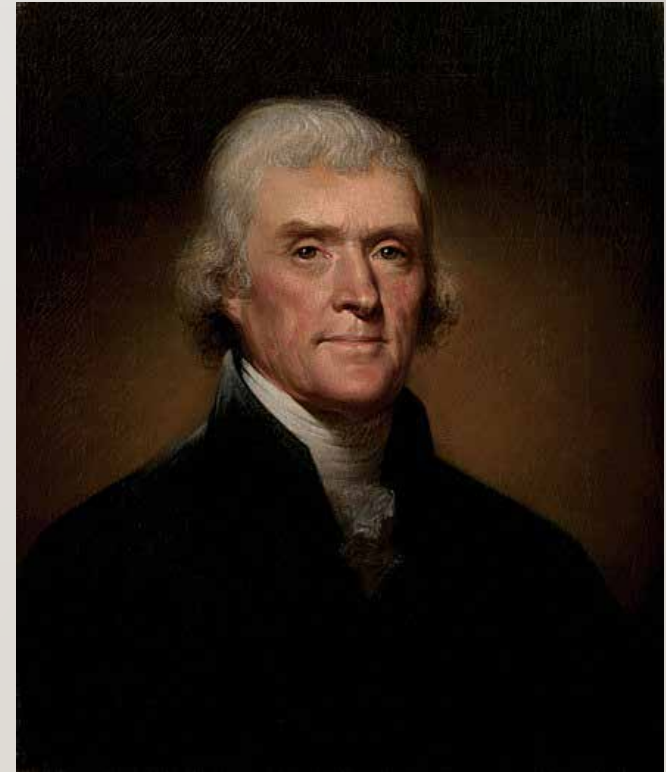
- Planning meeting themes - how can small acreage owners:

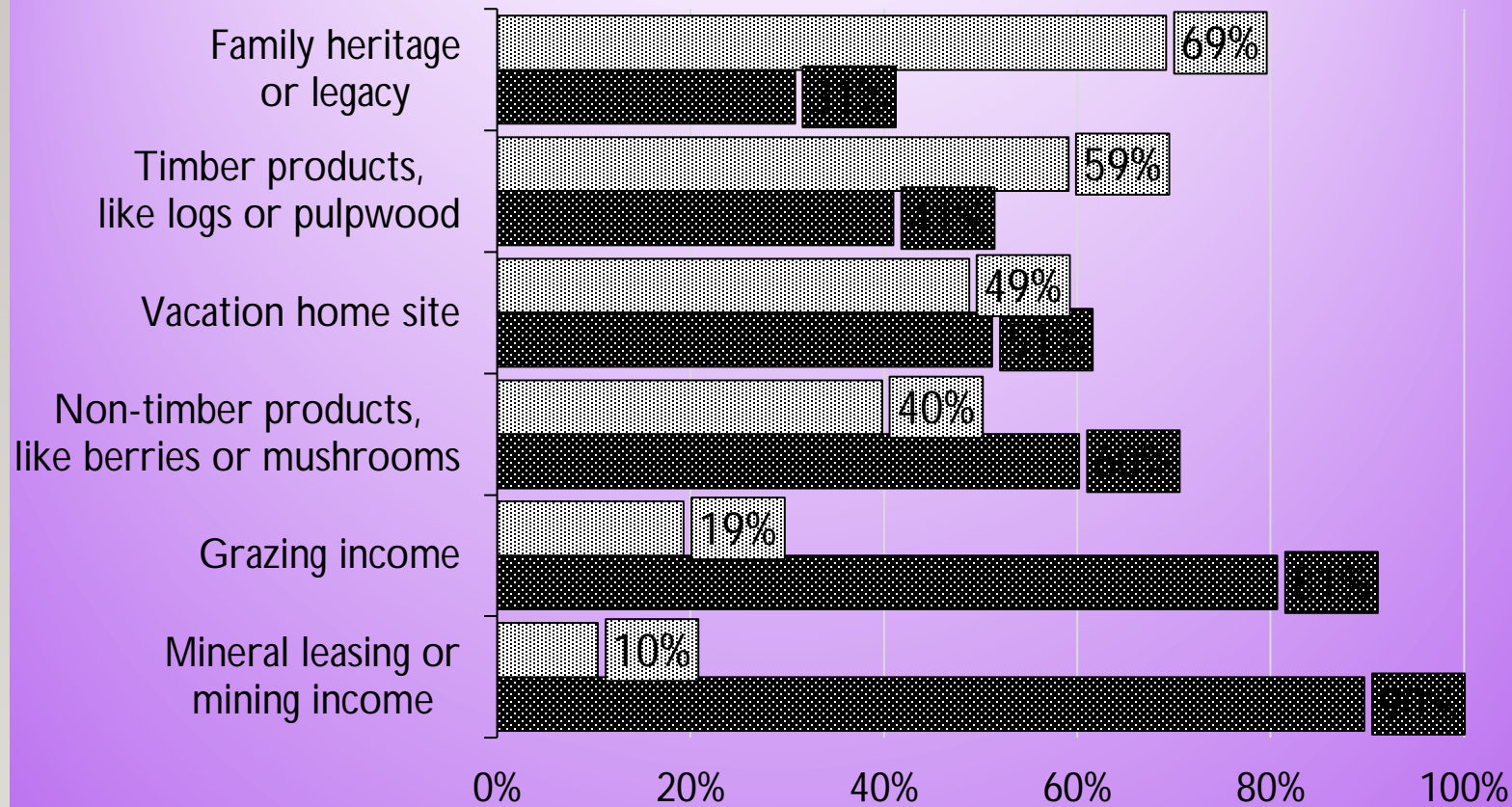

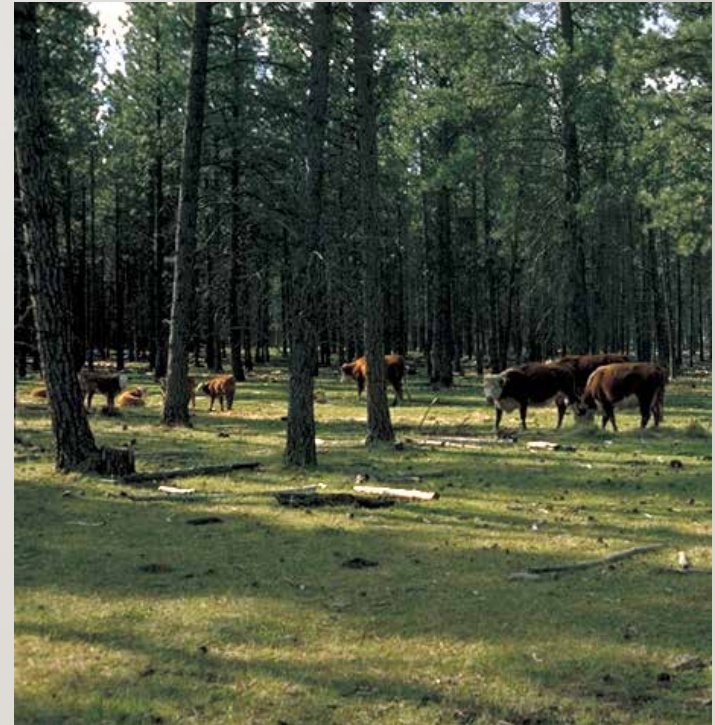
Americans and Land
